PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

This year your president and the Board have tried to find solutions to problems created by the tremedous growth in MISGA membership over the past ten years. Since 1979 membership has increased from around 1000 associates to almost 4000. Maintaining communication with all of the members has been a problem. Our new system of keeping track of everyone through Division Associates Chairman still has a few bugs to be worked out. For example, we recently discovered that 50 of our members were receiving duplicate mailings and I am sure that some others receive no mail at all from MISGA. Our goal is to have a ent, accurate and complete list of all associates. You can help by notifying your club representative if you receive more than one mailing or none at all.

Some duplicate mailings have resulted from an associate belonging to two clubs and being listed by both clubs. We suggest that if you do belong to more that one that you choose one to be your primary club and pay your \$2.50 per year MISGA dues to that Club Rep only. This does not mean that you can not play in MIXERS in both clubs.

As an officer in MISGA one gets lots of advice, suggestions and gripes when visiting other clubs. I welcome such encounters because it seems to be the only way I get feedback about how the associates feel about the way the organization is being run. However, since I nor any other Board members can visit all 43 clubs, I would be happy to receive letters from associates with suggestions and/or complaints. My term as president runs out Oct. 1, 1989, but I still have one more year on the board to serve you.

One of the areas I would like suggestions is that of allotting spaces for the various outings that we have out of our immediate area. With the size of our membership and with many resorts being willing to accept only around 120 golfers, it is difficult to come up with fair and equitable system. I think one change we could make would be to give associates who don't get accepted to an outing this year priority for that outing next year. I am not so big a dreamer to think that we can satisfy all of our members, but I do think that we must keep trying. EDWARD SCHMIDT

Ed Schmidt, President of MISGA in 1981 and leader of the movement to get Talbot Country Club into MISGA in 1976, died in late April at Memorial Hospital in Easton.

Through Ed's guidance and encouragement Talbot was one of the six original Eastern Shore clubs to join our organization and was the first to host a MISGA Board meeting in 1979.

Born in Kansas, Mo., he attended public schools in Lebanon, Pa., and graduated from Lebanon Valley College in 1937. He worked in the film products division of DuPont and later with Reeves Soundcraft Studios and RCA and was a member of the Society of Motion Picture and Television Engineers.

Our friend is survived by his wife, Kathrine, two sons, a sister, and five grandchildren. We extend our sympathy to them and deeply regret their and our loss.

ROLLING ROAD'S NEW CLUBHOUSE

The fairways are in excellent shape and the greens are lush and true (and still hard to read), the traps are raked and the pro shop is in good order and well staffed. All is well at Rolling Road Golf Club in Catonsville, or so it seems to the outsider. But there has been a major problem since a disastrous fire ruined a large part of the landmark clubhouse a little over two years ago.

If there were only three members of the club, a decision regarding repairing, rebuilding or demolishing and erecting a new structure, and the financing of same would doubtless have been most difficult. Cost, time, tradition and memories, convenience, and the updating and enlarging of the facilities entered the ring. And it has been a struggle but decisions have been made and the members and the stockholders of Beltway Realty look forward to the erection of a totally new clubhouse set immediately in front of the former mansion.

Exterior renderings and accurate loor plans of the new building are exhibited in the lobby of the old and they are impressive. President Harry Traurig advised that there is a commitment to take as much of the psst as possible to the new structure. The Beautiful cherry wood in the Coachlight room will be used in the new lounge. Some of the original stone from the mansion will be used to build a bulkhead behind the newly elevated fifteenth tee. The main rooms will center on that tee, being fairly close to it and will afford a striking view of that hole and much of the course as well as the spectacular panorama of the vastly changed skyline of Baltimore.

It is anticipated that the groundbreaking will take place late this Fall for the handsome new building. We look forward with the members to a beautiful and successful new Rolling Road Clubhouse.

Taylor Creek wanders with devious intent across and along eleven holes of this handsome testing course that was the Yeo Neck Farm until being purchased by L.W. Johnson for \$25,000 to be transformed into a golf course in 1962. Beginning life as a nine hole course it was expanded to eighteen in 1966 and there are boat slips, lighted tennis courts and a fine swimming pool and clubhouse to accommodate the 415 members of whom 205 are golfers.



A unique plan for using gold tees is used with those with handicaps of 22 or more qualifying for same after posting ten scores. Club Rep Alta Bloxom advises that the water carriers go as long as 175 yards and some of the Senior find that a bit long from the Whites.

Located seven miles south of Onancock near the towns of Melfa and Pungoteague on the way to the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel, it sounds like a great place to play the game.
