TIDBITS of MISGA HISTORY

MISGA MIXER PRIZE POOL

At the MISGA Board of Directors meeting on June 2, 1988, the gentlemen of the Board decided it would be a great idea to enhance the enjoyment for associates playing in a MISGA mixer. They batted around a few suggestions and finally agreed to establish a "prize pool" for the winners. It was decided that \$3 from the mixer entry fee would be allocated for the "prize pool." A club pro-shop gift certificate would be awarded to the winners of the mixer. In 1995, the Board increased the allocation to \$4 and, in 2002, the allocation was increased by the Board to the current \$5.

At the Board of Directors meeting on May 22, 2002, the "prize pool" payout percentage for the playing field in all MISGA golfing events was increased to a range of 25% to 33%.

GUIDELINES FOR CONDUCTING A MISGA MIXER

DETERMINE TEAM PAIRINGS & CART ASSIGNMENTS

- 1. The host Club Rep and host Head Pro should work together to determine the team pairings and cart assignments.
- 2. Establish 4-man teams each team should include an A, B, C & D level player.
- 3. The host Club Rep and visiting Club Reps should be assigned to the same cart. They should start on hole #1.
- The host Assistant Club Reps and the visiting Assistant Club Reps should be assigned to the same cart and should start on holes #2 & #3.
- 5. Each team should include a host club player and a mixture of players from the visiting clubs. It's a "mixer".
- 6. The "A" player should be the team captain and serve as the official scorer.

PRIZE POOL

- From each player's Entry Fee deduct \$5 (established by MISGA guidelines)
- 2. The prize pool payout will go to 25-33% of the playing field.

MISGA Championship Week

Registration begins at 10:00 am, a light lunch at 10:15 am with a shotgun start at noon. There will a post-golf cocktail hour *(cash bar)* followed by the awards banquet *(surf & turf)*. Each Gross and Net Grand Champion will receive a high quality trophy plus a \$100 pro shop gift certificate. Approximately 30% of the field will receive gift certificates. There will be prizes for the closest-to-the-pin winners. The entry fee for each tournament is \$110 each.
