Our members have cut back on going to other courses for numerous reasons. There may still be a COVID fear that produces fear in some, particularly those with those infamous underlying conditions. Some of us have expressed dismay at the higher prices some venues are charging since the onset of COVID. Others have seen the prices of everything they buy going up, particularly gasoline and the effect

that has on their fixed incomes. There are a few clubs that still send many golfers to their scheduled MISGA Mixers at away locations. Bay Hills and Compass Pointe will ask how many they can send! Other clubs will only send a few players where they used to send 15 - 20 players! The most common complaint I have heard, is the issue of slow play. I guess they are afraid they will be late for their afternoon naps!

On the subject of slow play, we tried a different format for our June, July and August Mixers at Crofton. We used the Stableford with a quota (36 minus playing handicap equals quota). Points were awarded for birdies or better, pars, and bogeys. A double bogey and above were awarded zero points. Since a player could not hurt or help a team once they got to a gross double-bogey,



players were encouraged to pick up at that point and record their "Most Likely Score" in accordance with USGA Rule 3.3. While most players played their ball until they holed out, higher handicap players found if they picked up at double-bogey gross, it picked up the speed of play. Some of the purists among us didn't like that idea, but the last group came in an hour faster than the last group a month earlier using the traditional best 2 of 4 method! We maintained the 4:30 pace of play all summer. We ran a test in the September mixer and reverted to the best-two-of-four format. The last group came in over 5 hours! I tell the groups before they tee off that if they lose sight of the group in front of them, it is NOT because they are playing fast!

Your club reps will begin the annual "schedule dance" later this fall. Your input to your rep can assist them in scheduling venues you want to attend, and the venues you have no interest in visiting. Scheduling is the toughest job your reps have to do all year! Give them your support and attend as many mixers as you can!

SCORING AND THE HANDICAP SYSTEM

Our esteemed former President, now Rules and Handicap Chair, weighs in the the following exposition. Strap on your Deep-Readers and have at it.

This season I have had several players question how we score mixers and whether it is fair to allow players to compete from different tees. The World Handicap System (WHS) takes all of that into account.

Scoring

The scoring issue centers around *Net Double Bogey*. It was recommended by the MISGA Board that clubs adopt rule 21.2 Maximum Score for mixers and use the *Maximum Score* of *Net Double Bogey*. *Net Double Bogey* is using *Course Handicap* not *Playing Handicap*, so an individual's score may be higher than the dot on the card. It is up to each club do decide what Maximum Score is for their mixers. Clubs that limit the *Maximum Score* to double bogey not *Net Double Bogey* gives a distinct advantage to higher handicap players.

When a player picks up and the marker asks what score they want it **must** be proceeded by an X on the scorecard. This tells the scoring officials that the individual did not finish the hole and is a most likely score.

Rules of Handicapping Rule 3.3 discusses when a player starts but does not finish a hole.

3.3 When a Hole is Started But Player Does Not Hole Out

There are various circumstances that might result in a player starting a hole but not holing out. For example, when:

- The result of the hole has already been decided,
- A hole has been conceded in match play,
- A player's partner has already posted a better score in a Four-Ball format and the players picks up, or
- A player has already reached their *net double bogey* limit on a specific hole.

When a player starts a hole but does not hole out for a valid reason, subject to other provisions set our within the *Rules of Handicapping*, the player must record their *most likely score* or *net double bogey*, whichever is lower, as appropriate for the situation and depending on the format of play.

The *most likely score* is:

- The number of strokes already taken to reach a position on a hole, plus
- The number of strokes the player would most likely require to complete the hole from that position, plus
- Any penalty strokes incurred during play of the hole.

Most likely scores should be determined on any hole in accordance with the following guidelines:

Position of the Ball	Strokes to be Added
If the ball lies on the putting green, and is not more than 5 feet from the hole:	Add one additional stroke Check out Diagram 3.3 below
If the ball lies between 5 feet and 20 yards from the hole:	Add 2 or 3 additional strokes, depending on the position of the ball, the difficulty of the green and the ability of the player
If the ball lies more than 20 yards from the hole:	Add 3 or 4 additional strokes, depending on the position of the ball, the difficulty of the green and the ability of the player



Notes:

- 1. There is no limit to the number of most likely scores that can be recorded within a player's adjusted gross score, provided that the failure to hole out is for a valid reason and not for the purpose of gaining an unfair scoring advantage.
- 2. Players with an established *Handicap Index*, the *most likely score* on any hole cannot exceed *net double bogey* for handicap purposes.
- 3. When a player submitting scores for an initial *Handicap Index*, the *most likely score* on any hole cannot exceed *par* plus 5 strokes.
- 4. In a Maximum Score format of stroke play, there may be situations where a player has not reached their *net double bogey* score before reaching the maximum score determined by Terms of the Competition. In such cases, the player should record either a *most likely score* or *net double bogey*, whichever is the lower score (see Rules of Golf, Rule 21.2).

Rule 3.3 Interpretations:

3.3/1 – Clarification of the Meaning of Most Likely Score for Handicap Posting and When it Should Be Used

A *most likely score* is used to record a player's probable score on a hole, when the hole has been started but the player did not hole out their ball. It should be a reasonable assessment of the number of strokes needed to complete the hole.

For example, in a Four-Ball match-play competition, a player's partner holes their ball from off the putting green for three. The player's ball lies 15 feet away from the hole in four strokes and

the score side cannot be improved. To save time, the player may pickup and record a *most likely score* for handicap purposes.

Based on the *most likely score* guidelines, the player would record a score of six or seven for handicap purposes (four strokes taken plus two or three additional strokes).

Different Tees

The WHS computes a course handicap for each set of tees used in a competition.

We will use the example of a player with 15.0 Handicap Index.

The players have the choice of playing from three different tees for this competition.

1st tee has a course rating 70.8, slope rating of 118, 6002 yds and par is 72, the player's course handicap is 14.

2nd tee has a course rating of 67.6, slope rating of 117, 5774 yds and par is 72, the player's course handicap is 11.

3rd tee has a course rating of 65.3, slope rating of 112, 5301 yds and par is 72, the player's course handicap is 8.

If par had been different from any of the tees the handicap would be adjusted up/down by the number of strokes in the difference of par. (i.e., 3rd tee par is 71 the players playing the first two tees would have an extra stroke added to their handicap or the players playing the 3rd tee would have handicap reduced by 1 stroke.).

The argument I hear most is that the players playing forward have an advantage, their handicaps are reduced to take in this difference. The difference between the 1st and 2nd tees is 228 yards (a long par 3). The difference between 2nd and 3rd tees is 473 yards (a long par 4). The difference between 1st and 3rd tees is 701 yards (a long par 5/6).

Golf is supposed to be enjoyable and letting players play from different tees according to their ability allows that.
