

## **Pace of Play**

The Fall 1983 issue of the MISGAGRAM has an article entitled "LET'S GO TO WAR AGAINST "SLOW PLAY" - A SELF-EXAMINATION." Pace of play has been an important topic for MISGA for at least 42 years and while there have been some improvements we still need to work on it. Players don't like 5-hour rounds and neither do the clubs who host MISGA events. This is a serious business.

The 2025 golf season is here, and it is about time to once again think about pace of play. There is some excellent material on the MISGA website which addresses this topic. If you would like a quick reference take a look at <u>USGA Tips and Suggestions for Improving Pace of Play</u>. It's only about 2 ½ pages long.

Another very good source of guidance is in the <u>R&A Pace of Play Manual</u>. This is a comprehensive document that addresses management practices, course set-up and player behavior.

# **Sharing Responsibilities at Rattlewood by T Watts**

Unfortunately, over the past multiple years we have had clubs drop out of MISGA because they haven't found anyone to take on the responsibility of being the club rep. At Rattlewood we have implemented a system to share the responsibilities between a committee of members. In addition to keeping our club viable when Doug Walters stepped down, this scheme has the added benefit that if we lose a committee member in the future, the task of finding a replacement is not as daunting, as the responsibility is not as great.

We have always had some sharing of responsibilities with Don Hoffmeyer as our treasurer, Bob Brewer handling closest to the pin, Rich and Carol Boardman handling the 50/50 and Jim Ballor managing the Rattlewood sign-up webpage. Warren McKinney coordinates match play for Rattlewood. We have been blessed also to have the Rattlewood GM/pro handle the pairings and scoring. But Doug performed all the other responsibilities.

After many years as the club rep, Doug stepped down a couple years ago. T Watts is the current club rep but did not take over all that Doug did. T sets up the season schedule and handles general communications and dealings with MISGA, Rattlewood members and prospective members. Pat Conroy compiles and distributes the rosters of Rattlewood players at mixers we are visiting, in addition to providing backup for Jim on the schedule webpage. John Seto provides summaries of our home mixers and generates the end of year reports. Tim Brewer coordinates merchandise purchases and distribution and also summarizing our budget and auditing our books. Don H also picked up the responsibility for the home mixer announcements and awarding of prizes (we needed someone who was there almost all the time, even when he wasn't playing – thank you Don!).

For all of you overworked reps out there, I recommend parsing out some of your responsibilities. Perhaps even some of the clubs that dropped due to loss of a rep could adopt this model and come back into the fold. It will make life better for all in the long run.

### **Frolics 'n Flings**

#### The 2024 Fall Frolic Report

A small but merry group attended, ate, drank and even played some golf at the Virginia Beach Fall Frolic this past October 6 to 12, 2024. Our host hotel was the Oceanfront Courtyard by Marriot and each room had balcony overlooking the ocean. Our MISGA format included a Sunday night reception with light fare and a cash bar for an hour plus, four buffet dinners with a varied menu on golf days, and we did play golf at four different courses. Monday was Heron Ridge, Tuesday was Virginia Beach National, Thursday was Honey Bee and Friday was Stumpy Lake. All were about 20 minutes from the hotel. The weather cooperated with no rain but a little windy on two days. Notice we don't play on Wednesday. We as a group prefer to have that day as a rest day. However, a few hearty golfers did play Cypress Point for a 5-day golf outing.

Competition results all with cash payouts were:

Heron Ridge was a standard 2 best-ball nets with an ABCD lineup. First place to team Ed Kelly, Wayne Rowland, Christa Storm, and Tom Tarpley at 145, Second place team Helen Mulford, Charlie Roderick, Steve Irish, and Tom Tarpley (blind) at 149.

Third place money went to Bill Buffington, Mike Roblyer, Hobie Swartwood, and Sandra Hochstein at 150. Additional payouts went to Ed Kelly's low gross 75, Steve Irish's low men's net at 77 and Helen Mulford low women's net at 75. Our Closest to the pin (CTP) Helen (again) with 2<sup>nd</sup> CTP Sandra Hochstein.

Tuesday at Virginia Beach National playing a Stableford format: first place team was Bill Buffington, Don Seyfferth, Sperry Storm, and Kip Seyfferth (blind)125, Second place to Ed Kelly, Steve Irish, Jack Sullivan, and Carol Boardman at 122, Third place to Greg Morris, Mike Roblyer, Christa Storm, and Sperry Storm (blind) at 117.

Low gross was Bill Buffington's 79, low men's net to Sperry Storm at 72, and low women's net to Carol Boardman 73.

CTP Rich Boardman and 2<sup>nd</sup> CTP Kip Seyfferth.

Day 3 golf at Honey Bee: first place to John Weiss, Chester Taylor, Hobie Swartwood, and Carol Boardman (blind) at 129. Second place to Jim Dong, Helen Mulford, Carol Boardman, and Michael Mulford (blind) 132. Third to Michael Mulford, Mike Roblyer, Tom Tarpley, and Christa Storm at 133.

Low gross to John Weiss at 68, low men's net to Ken Lee 69 and low women's net to Christa Storm at 71. CTP won by Ed Kelly and 2<sup>nd</sup> CTP Don Seyfferth.

Friday at Stumpy Lake GC: Playing a shamble: First place to Sid and Sandra Hochstein, Rich and Carol Boardman at 117, Second place to Ed Kelly and Martha Arthur, Hobie Swartwood and Christa Storm (blind) at 120, Third place to John Weiss, Charlie Roderick, and Sperry and Christa Storm also at 120. Tie was broken by a putt-off at dinner won by the Kelly team. Low gross by Michael Mulford with 72, low men's net by Tom Tarpley's 65, and low women's net by Christa Storm's 61!! CTP Helen Mulford and 2<sup>nd</sup> CTP Charlie Roderick.



ONE MORE THING: Ed Kelly was awarded the crown of MR VIRGINIA BEACH 2024 with a combined 4 round total of -1 net and Christa Storm was crowned MZ VIRGINIA BEACH with a combined 4 round +5 net.

All in all, we had 33 in attendance with 26 golfers from Bay Hills, Compass Pointe, Hobbit's Glen, Hampshire Greens, Holly Hills, Leisure World, Montgomery, Northwest, Ocean Pines, Rattlewood, Musket Ridge and Tantallon (National).

Only one major injury came at the expense of Wayne Rowland who tore a muscle in his hip on day one and could hardly finish the round, but he did on his first-place team. On Tuesday he left for home and a repair job. Last report he is healing and will be ready for next year's Fall Frolic.

Speaking of which, the Winter Fling at Crystal River 2025 has been cancelled by the resort for hurricane damage so severe they won't reopen until April/May of '25. We hope they will be receptive for February of 2026.

Open to MISGA members, prior MISGA members, prior attendees, want-to-be MISGA members and friends. We'll mix you up for golf and dinner. Roommates stay together for dinner and final golf day.

NEW for this venue: There is a 56-person limit to include golfers and non-golfers. Our rates are based on 20 room/40 person minimums.

#### **PROPOSED COMPETITION for Williamsburg 2025**

It's a work in progress. We will try and make teams with balanced handicap indexes and try to get as many combinations as possible over 4 golf days. Hopefully, the weather cooperates, and we keep Wednesday as an off day for rest/recuperation. For the hearty, the off-day golfers might want to try the Golden Horseshoe Gold course for about \$150.

If we manage to get a shotgun start at any of our chosen courses, we will do a ClusterPutt to start the round. Consideration is being given to the Chip-off competition used last at the Winter Fling. This is a part of the work in progress that might come down to the Sunday night reception decision with input from players. With all competitions there will be nominal cash prizes for outstanding performances. Awards will be at dinner and if there are scorecard ties, they will be decided by a putt-off at dinner. Always a crowd pleaser.

There will be a twist or two to make it fun on the course. Also, with a few drawings at dinner, you might be able to 'buy' a mulligan. Our Closest-to-the-Pin (CTP) on one par 3 in each round also pays 2<sup>nd</sup> CTP. Your ball does not have to be on the green, just not in the trap to be CTP. To top it all off, someone will EARN the title of Mr and Mz Fall Frolic 2025.

The option to play a round or more as a Pitch-and-Putt (PnP) competitor is available to anyone. There are conditions that may force a player out of normal golf and this PnP can keep you on the course.
